CalPERS Approves 2025 Health Plan Premiums, Benefits

The CalPERS Board of Administration on Wednesday approved health plan premiums for 2025, with an overall premium increase across all plans of 10.79%.

Basic (non-Medicare) plans will increase 9.08% overall. Members enrolled in CalPERS' Basic Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) plans will have an average premium increase of 8.72%. Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) Basic premiums will increase 9.82%.

CalPERS Medicare plan premiums will rise 22.25%. All announced premiums will take effect Jan. 1, 2025.

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"The health care landscape remains challenging, and while medical trend costs in our HMO plans are slightly lower than the national average, we are seeing significant increases in pharmacy costs across all plans," CalPERS Pension & Health Benefits Committee Chair Ramón Rubalcava said.

Last year, CalPERS approved 2024 average premium rate increases of 10.95% for Basic plans and 9.55% for Medicare plans.

Expanded Coverage, New Benefits

"The good news is that CalPERS offers numerous plans in a competitive marketplace, where members may have more affordable options that provide the same high-quality care," Rubalcava said. The CalPERS Board approved the following health plan expansions for 2025: Blue Shield's Trio HMO will expand into all of Contra Costa County and a portion of Shasta County. Health Net's Salud y Más HMO will be offered throughout Imperial County. Kaiser Permanente's HMO will expand into portions of Monterey County. UnitedHealthcare's Harmony HMO will expand into all of Napa County and portions of Contra Costa and Solano counties. "We have several lower cost health plans expanding into new parts of the state, giving our members more options and potentially more ways to save money on their health insurance, "CalPERS Chief Health Director Don Moulds said. In addition, health plans will include several new benefits:

Travel for Medically Necessary

Care: Standardizes coverage of travel and lodging for eligible medically necessary services that cannot be accessed locally for all Basic and Medicare members. Doula Services: Provides nonmedical care for pregnant and postpartum members to improve health education and provide physical and emotional support before, during and after pregnancy. The services will improve health equity and decrease disparities in care, especially for Black, Native American, and Pacific-Islander communities.

Reasons for Rate Changes

CalPERS cited several factors in this year's rate changes. One is the higher cost of providing medical services. The agency also noted the increased use of high-cost specialty and brand name drugs. In addition, the federal government significantly changed how it reimburses employer plans. This led to increased Medicare premiums and new costs for plan sponsors like CalPERS. Another factor: CalPERS will complete its transition to a single risk pool to improve its Basic PPO plans.

The change is expected to stabilize enrollment across both PPOs and HMOs. The value of a health plan's benefits and network will determine pricing, instead of its mix of healthy and unhealthy

members.

Starting in 2025, Blue Shield of California and Included Health

will begin administering CalPERS PPO plans.

This new partnership marks a milestone in CalPERS' continuing efforts to control healthcare costs, improve quality, and address the vital need for health equity. Blue Shield and Included Health will have strong financial incentives to improve the care CalPERS members receive.

Save the Dates: Open Enrollment

CalPERS members can shop health plans and make changes during Open Enrollment, which runs Sept. 16 through Oct. 11.Beginning Sept. 9, members can find Open Enrollment information on the CalPERS website and customized information in their myCalPERS accounts. Using the Search Health Plans tool in myCalPERS, members can compare plan monthly premiums and copays, and search for primary care doctors and specialists to see the plans in which they participate. "We encourage CalPERS members to take a look at the options during open enrollment and find the plan that best fits their needs," CalPERS Chief Health Director Don Moulds said.

Savvy Senior: Do You Need a Digital Will? Dear Savvy Senior, electronic devices and online LinkedIn).

My wife and I had our estate plan *including a will, power of attorney* and advance directive drawn up about 10 years ago but have recently read that our plan should include a digital will too. What can you tell us about this?

Dear Almost,

If you or your wife spend much time online, adding a separate digital will document to your estate plan that provides a list of your digital assets would be extremely helpful to your loved ones when you die, not to mention it will help protect your privacy. Here's what you should know.

Do You Have Digital Asset?

The term "digital assets" refers to personal information that is stored electronically on either a computer or an online cloud server account that belongs to an individual. Anyone who uses email, has a PIN code protected cell phone, makes online purchases, or pays bills online has digital assets. Digital assets generally require a username, a password, or a PIN to access and can be difficult if not impossible to retrieve if someone is incapacitated or passes away.

Creating a digital will (also known as a digital estate plan) will help your loved ones access your

accounts more easily so they can manage your electronic affairs, according to your wishes, after you're gone. This in turn will also protect your digital assets from hackers or fraud, which can happen to dormant accounts after you die.

How to Write a Digital Will

Email accounts (Gmail, Yahoo, Outlook, etc.). Cloud-storage accounts (like Google Cloud, iCloud, Dropbox, Microsoft OneDrive) Movie or music streaming services (like Netflix, Hulu, Spotify, Apple Online purchasing accounts (like

Your first step in creating a digital will is to make an inventory list of your digital assets, which includes everything from hardware to email accounts. Here are a few categories to help kick-start your list: Electronic devices (computer, smartphone, tablet, external hard drive).

Digital files (for photos, videos or documents)

Financial accounts (like bank and brokerage accounts, credit cards, cryptocurrency).

Bill paying accounts (utilities, mortgage accounts) Social media accounts (like Facebook, Instagram, Twitter,

Venmo or PayPal)

Subscription services (magazines, newspapers, Amazon Prime, etc.). Reward programs (travel, stores,

Membership organizations (AARP, AAA, etc.).

When making your list, you'll need to include usernames, passwords, PINS, account numbers or security questions for accessing each account. And provide instructions on how you want your assets managed after your death. For example: Do you want certain accounts closed, archived or transferred? Do you want specific files or photos to be deleted or

shared with loved ones? Do you want your social media profiles memorialized or deleted? Be clear and specific about your wishes. You'll also need to appoint a digital executor that you trust to execute your wishes after you die. From a legal perspective, you should know that most states have enacted the Revised Uniform Fiduciary Access to Digital Assets Act (RUFADAA), which legally recognizes digital estates. This law gives your personal representative or executor legally protected access to your online accounts.

Once your digital will is written, store it with your other estate plan documents either in a fireproof safe or file cabinet at home, on your computer hard drive, with your estate planning attorney or online at a reputable digital estate planning service like **Everplans.com** or **Clocr.com**. But make sure your executor knows where it is and has access to it. Also remember to keep your digital will updated regularly when you create any new digital accounts or change passwords.

Delta Dental:I would like to write an update regarding Delta Dental to help clarify CSR's efforts to work with CalHR and Delta Dental to ensure "in-network" dental benefits are available to retirees at reasonable costs. The survey, which was created with assistance from CSR staff, was designed to solicit specific information about the impact to retirees who were unable to find an in-network dentist within a reasonable distance from their residence. While recognizing most retirees are on a fixed income, we have encouraged members to utilize in-network providers to minimize costs. For those members who choose to seek treatment with out-of-network providers, for whatever reason, out-of-pocket costs will understandably be higher than those who choose in-network providers.

While it is recognized the annual maximum benefit has not increased in over 30 years, CalHR has responded to our inquiry and reported that 85% of Delta Dental members do not use the annual maximum benefit. The problems with Delta Dental did not occur overnight and coming up with solutions and options, that will be acceptable to CSR, CalHR, and Delta Dental, will also not be solved overnight; however, CSR staff and I are committed

to working with all stakeholders to ensure retirees have access to quality dental benefits at reasonable costs.

During previous conversations and discussions with CalHR, they contacted Delta Dental and responded to our inquiry with a letter. The letter is on the CSR website for your review. In the letter, CalHR, working with Delta Dental, explained certain trends within the dental field and they described Delta Dental's reimbursement rate. I encourage you to read the letter. We must work together to get and retain access to sustainable dental benefits for retirees. If you have suggestions that might be of benefit in these efforts, please send your suggestions to

<u>CalPERS 2025 Preliminary</u> <u>Premium Increases</u>

On Tuesday, July 16, I attended the Board of Administration meeting held in Monterey, California. During the meeting, the Board voted to adopt final premium rates for the 2025 calendar year, with some plans sustaining large increases. CalPERS members will be able to research available health plans and make plan changes during Open Enrollment, which runs from September 16 through October 11, 2024. Beginning on September 9, 2024, members can find Open Enrollment information on the CalPERS website and other specific and detailed information in their myCalPERS account. We encourage all retirees to do their research to determine the best plan for their individual and/or family needs.

As reported in July, CalPERS once again seemed inclined to allow UnitedHealth, Kaiser and others to significantly increase premium rates, and as feared, they allowed some very significant increases against our objections. There is not enough space to include all the proposed rate increases here, but I will add a few as examples. CalPERS voted to increase

premium rates for the Basic PPO Plans, with premiums for PERS Gold going from \$859 in 2024 to \$988 in 2025, a 9.82% increase, and PERS Platinum going from \$1,215.87 in 2024 to \$1,399 in 2025, also a 9.82% increase. Medicare Advantage Plans will see much larger premium increases for the coming year. For example, Anthem Medicare Preferred PPO went from \$405.83 in 2024 to \$487.56 in 2025, a 20.12% increase. Blue Shield Medicare PPO went from \$392.68 in 2024 to \$448.28 in 2025, a 14.16% increase.

Lastly, Medicare Supplement Plans, as anticipated, will experience the largest premium increases. For example, PERS Gold was \$406.60 in 2024 and will go up to \$546.13 in 2025, a 34.32% increase, and PERS Platinum was \$448.15 in 2024 and will go up to \$584.50, in 2025, a 30.74% increase. CalPERS reported there are many reasons for the increases. For further information about those reasons and additional information about specific plan premium increases, I encourage members to please review the "CalPERS Approves 2025 Health Plan Premiums, Benefits" article on the front page of this Retiree or the CSR website for additional information. With Open Enrollment fast approaching, I encourage each member to review and research the plans best suited for their family situation. Information related to all the 2025 premium rate increases can be found on the CalPERS website at www.calpers.ca.gov under the "Board Meetings" heading.

Ask HBC

I received an email from a retiree who was concerned because she was only being allowed to order a 30-day supply of medication she had been taking for years. She used to get a 90-day supply of the same medication and was understandably upset about having to go to her local pharmacy more frequently. As reported in

the May 2024 "To Your Health" article and reminding retirees in this article, beginning in January 2024, members enrolled in Basic medical plans were informed that, to receive a 90-day supply of some prescription medications, members had to order their prescriptions through the Optum Rx mail order service.

A benefit of ordering through Optum Rx is members get a 90-day supply at the price of a 60-day supply. For those members who choose to use their local pharmacies, they are only allowed to order a 30-day supply and will not enjoy the extra cost savings. If you are experiencing problems getting your prescription medication in a timely manner, I encourage you to call the CalPERS Customer Service number at (888) 225-7377.



Tuna Veggie Casserole

Ingredients

- 1 (12-ounce) bag whole-wheat egg noodles
- 2 (5-ounce) cans tuna, drained
- 2 (10 ³/₄-ounce) cans cream of mushroom soup
- 2 cups frozen veggies, like peas, broccoli, carrots, or a combination

As this is written, the California State Legislature is currently on Summer Recess and will return on Monday, August 5. They will then have four weeks to complete any unfinished business before adjourning for the year on August 31.

Here is an update on some of the bills that we are monitoring and may be of interest to CSR members:

Support AB 46 (Ramos)

Would exclude from state taxation the gross retirement income received by retired members of the U.S. Armed Forces and recipients of the Department of Defense's Survivor Benefits Program. AB 46 will honor those who have dedicated their lives to serving our country while helping to retain and attract uniformed service retirees.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 236 (Holden)

Would require health plans and insurers to annually update their provider directories to ensure accuracy when patients seek care. This bill would also protect enrollees and insured individuals who receive surprise bills after being provided inaccurate or misleading information contained in a health plan or policy's provider directory.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 820 (Reyes)

Would require the composition of various advisory groups and bodies to include an official or representative who advocates for, or administers programs that serve, older adults.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 2207 (Reyes)

Would expand the membership of various state Boards and

Commissions to include persons that serve or advocate for older adults.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 3129 (Wood)

Requires a private equity group or hedge fund to provide written notice to, and obtain written consent from, the Attorney General prior to a transaction with a health care facility, provider group, or provider to ensure that the transaction is in the public interest.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

SB 980 (Wahab)

Would improve the Medi-Cal dental benefit by lowering the eligibility age for crowns from 21 down to 13 years old. This bill would also add dental implants as a covered benefit.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Blue Shield of California Enhances Offerings, Expands Service Area for CalPERS Members in 2025 Nonprofit health plan will serve more than 570,000 CalPERS members and their families next year.

Following last month's announcement naming Blue Shield of California as the new administrator for its Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) plans, the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) has finalized updates to all of its health benefit offerings for 2025, with Blue Shield's Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) plans, Access+ and Trio HMO remaining competitively priced. 
