CalPERS Announces Health Plan Premiums for 2026

At the recent CalPERS Board of Administration meeting on Tuesday, July 15, the Board approved health plan premiums for the 2026 calendar year with an overall weighted premium rate increase of 8.21% which is 2.58% lower than the 10.79% increase from 2025.

Premium Rate Increases

- Basic (non-Medicare) plans will average +7.76%.
- CalPERS' Basic (HMO) plans will have an average of +6.48%.
- Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) Basic plans will have an overall +12.08%.
- Medicare plan premiums will see an average of +10.78% overall. Revenue changes from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in addition to

increased utilization of medical services further impact costs for both Medicare Advantage and Medicare Supplemental plans. Specialty and brand name drugs continue to be a driving factor in rate changes across all plans due to utilization and cost increases.

Plan Adjustments

- Blue Shield (Trio) will be replaced by Access+ in Monterey County to prevent significant premium increases and maintain a viable cost plan for members.
- United Healthcare (Harmony) expansion delayed into four Northern California counties for a year to stabilize member growth and control premium volatility. In addition, members in the PERS Gold PPO plan can continue to receive in-patient deductible credits of up to \$500 for completing an expanded menu of preventive care activities including cancer and depression screenings, vaccinations, among others. CalPERS members can shop health plans and make changes during Open Enrollment, September 15 through October 10. Beginning September 8, members can find Open Enrollment information on the CalPERS website and customized information in their myCalPERS accounts. Using the Search Health Plans tool in myCalPERS, members can compare plan monthly premiums and copays, and search for primary care doctors and specialists to see which plan works best for them. Premiums will take effect January 1, 2026.

The following tables represent the overall percentage premium change for each health plan between 2025 and 2026 using the state, single-party premium.

CSR Endorses Bei & Pacheco for CalPERS Board

Voting in the 2025 CalPERS Board of Administration election is coming soon. Important decisions about health premium rates, investment policies, and pension fund management will be on the ballot. The two open Member-at-Large seats represent all active and retired CalPERS members, including those from state agencies, schools, and local public employers. California State Retirees proudly endorses Dominick Bei for Position A and Jose Luis Pacheco for Position B. CSR believes they best represent our mission to protect the pension and health benefits of retired state employees.

All active and retired CalPERS members — excluding survivors and beneficiaries — are eligible to vote. Ballots will be mailed on Aug. 29 and must be received by Sept. 29 to be counted. The new term begins on January 16, 2026, and runs through January 15, 2030.

Savvy Senior: Where to Find Senior Discounts in 2025

Dear Savvy Senior, My husband and I are in our 50's and would like to know what resources you recommend for locating senior discounts, and what age do they kick in?

Dear Fay,

One of the great perks of growing older in America is the many discounts that are available. There are literally thousands of senior discounts on a wide variety of products and services including restaurants, travel and lodging, entertainment, retail, health, grocery stores, automotive services and much more. These discounts – typically ranging between 5 and 25 percent off – can add up to save you hundreds of dollars each year. So, if you don't mind admitting your age, here are some tips and tools to help you locate the discounts you may be eligible for.

Always Ask

The first thing to know is that most businesses don't advertise them, but many give senior discounts, so don't be shy about asking. You also need to know that while some discounts are available as soon as you turn 50, many others may not kick in until you turn 55, 60, 62 or 65.

Search Online

Because senior discounts frequently change and can vary depending on where you live and the time of year, the internet is the easiest way to locate them. A good place to start is at

TheSeniorList.com (click on the "Money" tab), which provides a large list of discounts in restaurants, grocery stores, retail stores, and for prescription medications, travel and more. You can also search for discounts by provider. Go to any standard search engine like Google or Bing and type in the business or

with AARP, or don't want to pay the \$15 membership fee, there are other organizations you can join that also provide discounts like the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC.us), the American Automobile Association (AAA.com), or for retired federal workers, the National Active and Retired Federal Employees



organization you're curious about, followed by "senior discount" or "senior discount tickets." Or use an AI tool like Chat GPT or Gemini to do a search. If you use an iPhone, you can even use the "Senior Discounts & Coupons" app (available in the App Store), which categorizes discounts by age and type.

Join a Club

Another good avenue to senior discounts is through membership organizations like AARP, which offers its members age 50 and older a wide variety of discounts through affiliate businesses – see

AARP.org/ViewMyBenefits. If, however, you don't like or agree

Types of Discounts

Here's an abbreviated rundown of some of the different types of discounts you can expect to

Restaurants: Senior discounts are common at restaurants and fastfood establishments – like Chili's, Denny's, Golden Corral, Outback Steakhouse, McDonald's and Sonic - ranging from free/discounted drinks to discounts off your total order.

Retailers: Many thrift stores like Goodwill and Salvation Army, and certain retailers like Joann, Kohl's, Michaels, Ross, Petsmart and Walgreens stores offer a break

to seniors on certain days of the week.

Supermarkets: Many locally owned grocery stores offer senior discount programs, as do some chains like BI-LO, Piggly-Wiggly, Fry's, New Seasons, Fred Meyer and Hy-Vee, which offer discounts on certain days of the week.

Travel: American, Delta and United Airlines provide discounted senior fares for select destinations in the U.S. to passengers 65 plus, while British Airlines offers AARP members \$65 off economy seats. Amtrak provides a 10 percent discount to travelers over 65. Most car rental companies give discounts to 50-plus customers or AARP members. Royal Caribbean, Norwegian and Carnival cruise lines offer senior rates to cruisers 55 and over. And, most hotels offer senior discounts, usually ranging from 10 to 30 percent.

Entertainment: Most movie theaters, museums, golf courses, ski slopes and other public entertainment venues provide reduced admission to seniors over 60 or 65. And the National Park Service offers a lifetime senior pass for those 62 and older for \$80.

Below are updates on 1) Open Enrollment, 2) Pharmacy Benefit Manager Contract 2026, 3) Dependent Eligibility Verification, 4) CSR on Your Side

Open Enrollment 2026

CalPERS has announced the health plan Open Enrollment period for 2026 will take place September 15, through October 10, 2025. Any changes made to your medical, dental or vision plans will take effect on January 1, 2026.

Once again, there have been significant increases to some of the medical plans. Each retiree is encouraged to review all available plans to choose the plan which best suits the needs of the retiree and their family. In the July 2025 "To Your Health," CSR provided a list of the proposed 2026 premium rates. The CalPERS Board of Administration voted on and approved the

"proposed" increases, with no changes, during their meeting on July 15, 2025. Members are encouraged to visit the CalPERS website to review the final premium rates for 2026.

Pharmacy Benefit Manager Contract 2026

During the recent meeting held in Monterey on July 14-16, 2025, the CalPERS Board of Administration members voted to approve CVS as the new Pharmacy Benefit Manager for 2026.

CalPERS staff reported that, for the past 12 months, they have been conducting discussions and negotiations with various vendors in an effort to provide outpatient pharmacy benefits to members in the PPO Basic and Medicare supplement plans as well as for many of the HMO Basic and Medicare Advantage plans. The CVS contract will take effect on January 1, 2026.

The contract with the current vendor, OptumRx (Optum), was nearing its end. Optum's contract began in 2017 and was supposed to be a five-year contract, but it was extended twice for a total of nine years.

As anticipated, CSR members are beginning to provide potential problems, which CalPERS staff are currently unable to answer. For example, one retiree reached out to question if CVS would honor her prior-authorization injections Optum approved through June 2026. When I reached out to CalPERS with the example, the response was, "I can say that CVS will receive a list of prior authorizations from Optum that will be honored to the extent the drug is on the 2026 formulary. If the drug is not, there will be a transition fill." CalPERS indicated they have future meetings with CVS and a more definitive answer could be provided at a later date. CSR will work with CalPERS to see if they are willing to require CVS to provide a representative who could work on behalf of CSR members to help resolve issues in an expeditious manner, similar to what Optum provided.

Dependent Eligibility Verification

From time to time I post articles about the Dependent Eligibility Verification process with CalPERS. I haven't posted about this subject for a few months and it has come to my attention there is some confusion with this process. I would like to try to clarify. Dependent Eligibility Verification is the process of reverifying the eligibility of your spouse, domestic partner, children, stepchildren, and domestic partner children (dependents) enrolled in health and/or dental benefits. To ensure only eligible dependents are enrolled in employer-sponsored health benefits, Government Code Section 19815.9 and California Code of Regulations Section 599.855 mandates you re-verify the eligibility of your dependents. Government Code Section 22959 authorizes the review of your dependents' dental benefits enrollment.

The eligibility of your dependents will be re-verified once every three years. The re-verification cycle is based on your birth month. For more detailed information about the verification schedule, please visit the CalPERS website. This is a three-year repeating cycle. If you enroll dependent(s) within six months of your birth month, their eligibility will be re-verified during your next cycle.

Now here is where I will try to clarify the confusion. The Dependent Eligibility Verification does not include disabled dependents or parent-child relationship dependents who are enrolled in employer sponsored health or dental coverage. According to CalPERS, disabled dependent(s) and parent-child relationship dependent(s) have a separate re-verification process. If you are still confused about whether your particular dependent qualifies for the Dependent Eligibility Verification process, please call CalPERS to avoid any potential unnecessary disruptions in benefits.

CSR on Your Side

From time to time, CSR is called upon to assist members or survivors with serious matters affecting their health or pension benefits. I would like to share an example of a situation where CSR, with its resources and contacts, was able to provide resolution to retirees experiencing difficult problems with their health plans. I believe the assistance CSR provided is an excellent example as to why state of California retirees should be members of the California State Retirees organization.

I was contacted by a retiree who


was concerned after she renewed a prescription and was required to pay \$50.00 for a one-month supply. The same prescription used to only cost the member \$5.00 a month. After speaking with OptumRx, it was determined that when the member was in a Basic plan, the medication was considered Tier 1, which was why she paid \$5.00 a month; however, after she transitioned to Medicare, the same medication was now considered Tier 3 in the formulary, which generated the higher out-of-pocket cost.

I reached out to CalPERS to get an explanation as to why a medication would be classified as Tier 1 in Basic and Tier 3 in Medicare, and we'll gladly post the information as soon as I get their response. It is highly recommended that any retiree making the transition from Basic to Medicare conduct a complete review of their prescription medication(s) with their provider to make sure they are able to get the needed medication at the affordable price.

Copycat Egg McMuffin

Ingredients

1 Tbsp. neutral oil

6 slices Canadian bacon

2 Tbsp. plus 3 tsp. unsalted butter, divided

6 English muffins, split

6 slices American cheese

6 large eggs

Equipment Needed

A 3 1/4" round mold

Directions

Preheat oven to 200°. In a large nonstick skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Cook bacon, turning halfway through, until just heated through on each side, about 2 minutes total. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate; pat off excess oil.

In same skillet over medium-high heat, melt 1 Tbsp. butter. Toast English muffin tops, turning halfway through, until lightly golden on each side, 3 to 4 minutes total. Repeat with English muffin bottoms and 1 Tbsp. butter.

Arrange English muffin bottoms on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Top with a slice of cheese. Place English muffin tops and bacon on another parchment-lined baking sheet. Keep both sheets warm in the oven until ready to use.

In same skillet over medium-low heat, melt 1/2 tsp. butter. Crack an egg into 3 1/4" mold, poke yolk with a fork so it runs out slightly into the white, and cover with a lid. Cook until egg white is firm to touch but yolk is still a little jammy, 3 to 5 minutes.

Transfer egg to English muffin bottom. Top with bacon. Close with top English muffin. Repeat with remaining butter and eggs.

ith final approval of the 2025-26 State Budget which ultimately required over \$40 billion in cuts, shifts, deferrals, borrowing, and reserve spending to close the deficit - the California State Legislature headed home for Summer Recess on July 18 and will return on Monday, August 18. We are happy to report that the budget does in fact include a military retirement tax exclusion of up to \$20,000 of income for veterans or their surviving spouses. The provision is effective January 1, 2025, but sunsets (for now) on January 1, 2030. After years of supporting similar efforts, it is a nice win for CSR and all the groups who advocated for the exemption to recognize the sacrifice of retired U.S. military personnel and sought to make it more affordable for them to live in California. Upon their return, the Legislature

will have less than a month to complete any unfinished business before adjourning for the year on September 12.

Here is an update on some of the bills that we are monitoring and may be of interest to CSR

members: **Support**

AB 53 (Ramos)

[Given that the budget essentially implemented AB 53, Asm. Ramos' bill is likely to be repurposed.

Congratulations to the Assembly Member for his dedication to this cause.] Would exclude up to \$20,000 of retirement pay and annuity payments from the U.S. Department of Defense Survivor Benefit Plan received by eligible taxpayers from gross income for Personal Income Tax (PIT) purposes from 2025 through 2030. AB 53 will honor those who have dedicated their lives to serving our country while helping to retain and attract uniformed service retirees to California.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Revenue & Taxation Committee.

AB 280 (Aguiar-Curry)

Would create mechanisms and procedures to improve health plan provider directories to ensure that consumers receive accurate information and can get efficient access to care.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AB 371 (Haney)

Would require that dental appointments are available within 48 hours, nonurgent dental appointments within 18 business days, and preventive dental care appointments within 20 business days of a request.

STATUS: Two-year bill. AB 1190 (Hanev)

Would protect all consumers, but particularly seniors,

from exploitative websites impersonating the DMV and overcharging for services.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Appropriations Committee.

AJR 3 (Schiavo)

Recognizes Social Security,
Medicare, and Medicaid as
the foundation for income
and health care security for
millions of Americans and calls
on California's Congressional
Representatives to oppose any
effort to cut or privatize these lifesaving benefits.

STATUS: Senate Third Reading File.

AJR 8 (Schiavo)

Calls on California's Congressional Representatives to vote against cuts to Social Security and to prevent service delays and office closures.

STATUS: Assembly Third Reading File. SB 23 (Valladares)

Would exempt the primary residences of veterans who have received a 100% disability rating from the Department of Veterans Affairs from property taxes in the State of California.

STATUS: Awaiting hearing in Senate Military & Veterans Affairs Committee. SB 56 (Seyarto)

Would exclude service connected disability payments from the calculation of household income for the Low

Income Exclusion of the Disabled Veterans' Property Tax Exemption, as Veterans must receive that compensation in order to qualify for the tax exemption in the first place.

STATUS: Assembly Revenue & Taxation Committee Suspense File.

SB 351 (Cabaldon)

Would prohibit a private equity group or hedge fund involved with a physician or dental practice in California from interfering with the professional judgment of physicians or dentists.

STATUS: Assembly Third Reading File.

Elder Abuse: Learn the Signs, Solutions, and Safeguards

As California's older-adult population grows, so does the need for all Californians to recognize, prevent, and report elder abuse.


What Is Elder Abuse?

According to the California
Department of Aging (CDA), more
than 200,000 older and dependent
adult abuse cases are reported
every year. While those numbers
are on the rise, the department
notes the abuse of older adults is
still significantly underreported.
The California Department of
Social Services (CDSS) states that
abuse can take the form of:

- Physical abuse Hitting, kicking, burning, dragging, overor under-medicating
- Sexual abuse Unwanted sexual contact or sexual exploitation
- Abandonment Desertion or willful forsaking by anyone having responsibility for care
- Isolation Preventing the individual from receiving mail, telephone calls, visitors
- Financial abuse Theft, misuse of funds or property, extortion, duress, fraud
- Neglect Failure to provide food, clothing, shelter, or health care for an individual under one's care when the means to do so are available
- Self-neglect Failure to provide food, clothing, shelter, or health care for oneself
- Mental suffering Verbal

assaults, threats, causing fear

• Abduction — Removal from this state and restraint from returning to this state of any older or dependent adult



• There's a lack of necessities, such as food, water, utilities, medications, and medical care.



Elder abuse can be any or all of these things. But, most of all, it's a crime.

What Are the Signs?

Here are key warning signs of elder abuse from CDSS:

- The older adult's explanation for an injury is inconsistent with its possible cause.
- There are recent changes in the older or dependent adult's thinking (seeming confused or disoriented).
- The caregiver is angry, indifferent, or aggressive toward the older or dependent adult.
- Personal belongings, papers, or credit cards are missing.

- The caregiver has a history of substance abuse, mental illness, criminal behavior, or family violence.
- Another person's name is added to the older adult's bank account or important documents, or frequent checks are made out to cash.

What Can I Do?

For all CalPERS members — If you notice any suspicious activity related to your CalPERS benefits or are concerned you are experiencing financial abuse related to your CalPERS account, call us immediately at 888 CalPERS (or 888-225-7377). In addition, make sure you have a CalPERS Special

Power of Attorney on file to ensure your wishes are followed in case you are ever incapacitated.

For CalPERS Health Program participants as well as all Californians receiving health care services — Your health care providers are always there to help you and can assist with advice and services. In addition, all California licensed health care providers as well as many other health-related professionals are required by law to report abuse.

If you or a loved one is at home, in a hospital, or at risk of or experiencing homelessness

— Call DSS' Adult Protective Services 24-hour hotline at (833) 401-0832; enter your ZIP code when prompted to be connected to your county office.

If you or a loved one is in a long-term care facility — Contact CDA's Long-Term Care Ombudsman CRISIS line, available around the clock: (800) 231-4024.

If you or a loved one is outside California — The U.S. Administration on Aging's

Eldercare Locator offers an array of services for older adults, including elder abuse reporting and resources. Call (800) 677-1116 Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Eastern time.

Remember: If you or your loved one is in immediate danger, call 911.


